INTERNET CRIMES AGAINST CHILDREN

This session will provide youth safety information needed to help stop a child from becoming victim of technology-facilitated exploitation. The “virtual world” possesses countless opportunities for youth to learn, create and connect with others. However, the “virtual world” not unlike the “real world” can pose serious risk to our youth. Therefore, it is critical that parents and other caring adults understand the benefits and risks associated with new technologies. Technology is becoming more creative and efficient everyday, and so is its appeal to younger generations. Today, the majority of youth have more skills and awareness of new technology than their parents and teachers. Fortunately, you don’t have to be a computer expert to help keep children safe from technology-facilitated abuse. Actually, there are simple tips that can help you use modern technology to strengthen communication between you and children. At the conclusion of this session you will learn the following objectives:

- Empower children to protect their NAME, IDENTITY and REPUTATION when using technology.
- Communicate with children about the benefits and risks of popular technologies such as: social networking sites (i.e. facebook™, myspace™), text messaging, on-line gaming, webcams and others.
- Identify the red flags that a child may be engaging in dangerous online behavior.
- Know how to REPORT if you suspect a child is in danger of technology-facilitated abuse.

Please attend and learn how you can help keep kids safe online! Lets teach children how to technology responsibly so that they may reap it’s numerous benefits, safely.
