Dr. Stikes has a B.A. in Biological Sciences and Psychology, M.Ed. in Rehabilitation Counseling, M.A. in Sociology and Anthropology, Master of Divinity, and Ph.D. in Counseling. He has written numerous articles dealing with student development, multicultural and international issues, and a book, ***Black Students in Higher Education***. Dr. Stikes is currently a Professor of Counseling and Sociology at Missouri Baptist University and an Ordained Baptist Minister. He served as Associate Minister at Washington Tabernacle Missionary Baptist Church in St. Louis.
